Spring has two meanings: 1) the season between winter and summer and 2) to leap or move swiftly.

To our Village "Spring" means both the time to leap into action after what seemed to be a long winter. During those winter months the Village reviews its strategic goals and projects for the upcoming year.

The last couple of years has been tough on all villages and cities, but we have proven that through our excellent team members we have survived and thrived during the Covid years.

This spring we will again have multiple road and infrastructure projects. When completed we will have resurfaced 75% of our local roads in 4 years. We are spending more than 1 million on roads again this year.

Spring also brings rain showers and flooding. Through a number of grants, work will continue to update our drainage system. Please do your part in keeping ditches and streams free of debris to improve run off. A new bridge will also be installed on Atkinson Road.

In terms of what is new this spring, Gas N Wash convenience store will begin construction at the corner of Route 176 and Bradley Road. There will be regular and diesel fuel with a state-of-the-art car wash. The design will have a vintage general store feel with a restaurant and a drive through Dunkin Donuts.

Off Bradley Road in Polo Park, construction will begin on the Padel Club of Green Oaks. This will sure to be a hit with racquet sport enthusiasts. The courts are 25% smaller than tennis courts and is extremely popular with all age groups. The club will provide a great social atmosphere for the community.

The additional income from just these two projects will have the Village continue to meet our fiscal responsibilities and provide additional resources for the Village of Green Oaks.

Back in 2020, the Village purchased the property across from Village Hall on the north east corner of Buckley and O'Plaine Roads. This summer the Village plans to have a Memorial Garden constructed that will beautify and provide pedestrians and cyclists a place to recharge.

Finally, it's time to have a refresher course in public safety. There will be a Town Hall Meeting at Oak Grove School in the Patrick Patt Gymnasium on Thursday, April 28th at 7 p.m. The Sheriff Deputies from our area will lecture us on security and safety. We can all assist the police to get involved in the prevention of and protection from events that could endanger the safety of our families and neighbors. The program will also be on a "GoToMeeting" broadcast in case you can't make the meeting.

Special Service Area No. 13 – After a few years of planning, meetings with impacted residents, and a formal petition process, the Committee is pleased to announce the formation of its newest Special Service Area ("SSA"). SSA 13 will bring city water to the residents along Haven Lane, Lockwood Drive and Placid Lane east of O'Plaine Road. The project is expected to cost nearly \$700,000 and will be financed by the sale of municipal bonds. The bonds will be paid over 20 years via a special service area assessment added to the real estate tax bill of the benefitted properties. Construction is anticipated to start in late May or early June. Updates will be provided to impacted residents when the exact schedule is known. If you are interested in bringing municipal sewer or city water to your neighborhood, please contact the Public Works Committee.

Municipal Sewer Rate Increase – Although nobody likes a rate increase, Lake County Public Works ("LCPW") and the Village of Libertyville have increased their rates which, in turn, require us to raise our rates in order to keep providing municipal sewer service on a break-even basis. Libertyville has an intergovernmental agreement, or contract, with LCPW to provide sewerage treatment plant and a sewerage interceptor services to LCPW customers. Green Oaks, in turn, has a contract with LCPW which requires us to pay LCPW for sewage treatment. When either of those entities raises rates, it requires a corresponding pass-through increase to our residents. This year we have received rate increase notices from both Libertyville and LCPW. Following a comprehensive study by the Village Engineer, the Committee has recommended an increase of approximately 6%, or roughly \$3.50 per month.

Grant Awards for Stormwater Management – The Committee is pleased to announce that it has received a couple of awards from the Lake County Stormwater Management Commission for drainage projects in the Village. One of the grant awards will help the Village with the replacement of certain storm sewers in the Thornbury Village subdivision. The other grant will assist the Village with remediation of flooding along Bradley Road by Lambs Lane. Village Engineer Ben Metzler was instrumental in assisting the Committee with the application process. Thank you Ben!

Keep your Swales Clear – As the ice melts and spring showers start up, please take a moment this weekend to check your swales and the culvert pipe underneath your driveway. Making sure these areas remain clear is critical to allowing the storm water to flow during the typically wet spring months and reducing nuisance flooding when the heavy rains come.

Streets & Roads ~ 2022 Road Update


The Village will be constructing several road projects in 2022. In addition to the yearly Road Improvement Program, the Village will also be performing roadway rehabilitation as part of Special Service Area 13 and rehabilitating Baker Road. Additionally, the Village is replacing the Atkinson Road Bridge.

During construction, the Village will provide periodic updates on the status of construction and upcoming project information via Blackboard Connect. Please contact the Village if you are not receiving these or any other updates.

In addition to these projects, the Village will continue to participate in the Lake County Municipal League's joint purchasing program for crack sealing of roads, hydrant painting and street sweeping.

The Village has repaved approximately 15 miles of road since 2019, and we are looking forward to another season of substantial and beneficial road improvements throughout Green Oaks.


2022 Road Improvement Project –
Roads within the Lake Somerset and
Forest Glen Subdivision will be milled
and overlaid with curb repairs and
drainage structure adjustments/repairs
as warranted. Additionally, the portion
of Bayonne Drive north of Route 176
will be repaved and the intersection
with Route 176 reconfigured. This work
will start early summer. Funding for this
project will be a combination of Rebuild
Illinois Grant Funding, Motor Fuel
Tax funds, and local funds. A public
information meeting will be held in May
for this project.





Baker Road Rehabilitation – Baker Road (off of Route 176) will be substantially overhauled this summer, including addition of a ribbon curb, drainage improvements, and roadway rehabilitation. This work will follow a Lake County Public Works Department watermain replacement project and will be funded using Tax Increment Finance (TIF) District funds.

SSA 13 Road Improvements – The Village will be repaving the roads within the County Clerk's subdivision – Haven Lane, Lockwood Drive, and Placid Drive – as part of the watermain improvements being installed in SSA 13. We will use full depth reclamation with cement stabilization on the roadways. This is a robust repair method which utilizes cement to strengthen the existing base. Additionally, cross-road culverts will also be replaced. We anticipate this work starting in July, but it is dependent on the installation of the watermain. The roadway component of this project is being funded with local funds. A public information meeting will be held in May for this project.





Atkinson Road Bridge - The timber bridge on Atkinson Road just west of the Canadian Pacific Railroad tracks is under construction and being replaced with a three-sided concrete arch structure. Campanella and Sons, Inc. is the general contractor for this project. Completion is anticipated in mid-May, depending on weather. Atkinson Road will be closed at the railroad tracks for the duration of this project. This project is being funded with local funds.



TIF News!

Even though the winter has been long and cold, there has been a lot of TIF activity in Green Oaks. Please take a moment to see what has and is being accomplished in the Village.

Over the Last 3 Months:

- Completed a new "Village of Green Oaks" commercial business monument sign on Baker Road.
- Approved the development of a new gas station/mini-mart and car wash on the Inland property west of Harley Davidson.
- Jointly, in partnership with the Lake County Forest Preserve, completed invasive brush clearing along the North Shore Bike Path on the north side of Glenmore Woods.



- Approved beautiful new entry signage for Green Oaks Senior Living
- Continue to discuss the development of a new truck sales and maintenance facility with the CIT organization on the property across from Lambs Farm.

In the Next 3-4 Months:

- Complete brush clearing on the south side of Route 176 between Ashford Drive (Glenmore Woods) and Arcadia Drive (est. completion by mid-May)
- Reconstruct Baker Road with various drainage improvements (est. completion in August)
- Work with the businesses along Route 176 corridor to add additional "Village of Green Oaks" commercial business monument signs - with the goal of removing all small business signs along Route 176

This year we also look to complete the phase 1 study of widening Rt. 176 from two to three lanes (adding a center turn lane). This is a long-term project that has 3 phases, which will need the support of IDOT and other elected local and state officials. We feel this is a must in making Rt. 176 safer and more efficient to all business owners and residents in this area.

For a small village we are proud of our TIF accomplishments, seeking to improve our local infrastructure and quality of life throughout the TIF district.

**The Green Oaks TIF District is from the Green Oaks Senior Living facility (Old Jamaican Gardens) to The Sheridan at Green Oaks and meanders through the Rondout Industrial area. The TIF district continues to improve and beautify the area without using substantial funding from the Village's general fund and no funds from taxpayers.

While we all live in a safe community, we are not immune from crime. The Lake County Sheriff and deputies do a great job for us and want to help us understand how we can play an important role in the safety of our community. Please join us April 28th at 7:00PM in the Patrick Patt Gym at Oak Grove School for an open house where the Sheriff will provide useful information on how we can participate in the safety of ourselves, our family and our community.

In February, Dynegy Energy Services sent out a letter informing all residents of an electrical aggregation agreement made between the Village and Dynegy. In August, The Village contracted with Dynegy for the electric supply to the Village and Village residents. We committed to two years at a price of \$0.06758 per kWh (kilowatt hour). Currently the ComEd price is \$.077 cents per kWh (kilowatt hour). At this time, we are receiving a 13% discount by participating in the program. The electric you receive at your home is supplied seamlessly by ComEd and you continue to be billed by ComEd just at the lower rate. Your participation is not mandatory and you can opt out anytime. To do so, just follow the procedures in your letter.

Severe Weather Preparedness~Fire Safety Message

KNOW THE TERMS: Familiarize yourself with important weather terms to stay alert and know when to take action to protect yourself and others.

- Severe Thunderstorm Watch conditions are favorable for the development of severe thunderstorms containing large hail and damaging winds.
- Severe Thunderstorm Warning large hail and/or damaging wind has been reported by spotters, or is about to develop. Take action
 Go to a substantial shelter immediately.
- Tornado Watch conditions are favorable for the development of tornadoes.
- Tornado Warning a tornado has been reported by spotters, or National Weather Service meteorologists have determined that one is about to form in the next several minutes. Take Action – go to a substantial shelter immediately.

IDENTIFY A SAFE PLACE: Before a storm strikes, it is important to be aware of your surroundings and identify a safe place to ride out a storm. Preferably, somewhere indoors, and away from windows. If you can hear thunder, you are close enough to a storm to be struck by lightning. If you are outdoors, seek shelter immediately.

STAY INFORMED: This forecast is a good reminder that people should always have multiple ways to receive notifications and updated information about severe weather warnings, such as through a NOAA weather alert radio, Wireless Emergency



Alerts (WEA), weather alert apps, TV and radio broadcasts, the Internet, outdoor warning sirens and more. For storm threats at night, resident should make sure that their cellphones are enabled to receive emergency alerts and notifications.

PREPARE YOUR FAMILY: Your family may not be together if a disaster strikes, so it is important to know which types of disasters could affect your area and know how you will contact one another and reconnect if separated. Develop a family emergency plan and review it with all family members.

Visit Ready. Illinois.gov for step-by-step instructions on how to prepare for, survive and rebuild after any storm or emergency.

EMERGENCY KIT: In light of the COVID-19 pandemic, a few new items should be included in your emergency supply kit, including face coverings for every member of your family, hand sanitizer, and disinfectant wipes. Other items to include in a basic emergency supply kit are: water, food, NOAA weather radio, flashlight, batteries, phone charger, and prescription medications. A complete list can be found online at ready.gov/kit.

The Libertyville Fire Department recommends that every family be informed and prepared for severe weather situations. Just a little planning and preparation can go a long way in keeping your family safe. The Fire Department can be reached at 847-362-5664 for additional information.





RONDOUT SCHOOL Sunflower Project

I want to be like a sunflower So even in the darkest days I will stand tall and Find the sunlight...

The Rondout School Sunflower project began at the start of the pandemic in April 2020 as a way to bring hope and anticipation of new growth during the challenges of those early days of COVID19. The bright sunflowers were grown by our District 72 families extending the joy and beauty of nature throughout our neighborhoods. The first two years of the project were focused on our Rondout School District 72 families. It was such a popular activity that we decided to bring it back this year as well. This year Rondout is expanding the Sunflower project to the larger community as we celebrate what we hope will be the end of the pandemic.

We look forward to adding more bright spots to our neighborhoods with this popular project. Our students are extending their involvement this year to the creation of the actual seed packets using student created sunflower art. Seed packets will be distributed to businesses and homeowners associations in the area. Starting the week of April 18th, sunflower seed packets including directions for planting will also be available at the Green Oaks Village Hall. Once your seedlings mature, you can plant them in the ground and give them to neighbors and friends. For more information or if you would like to receive a packet of seeds, please reach out to mainoffice@rondoutsd72.org to make your request. Hope that you will join us is spreading the sunshine throughout our community.

How To Grow A Sunflower

- Plastic Cups or Seed Starting Pots
- Soil or Compost
- Garden Sunflower Seeds
- Plant Sprayer (optional)
- Medium Size Flower
 Pots for transplanting.
- Put some damp soil
 in a plastic cup so it
 comes almost to the top.



- 2) Then poke your finger in the soil to make a hole for your sunflower seed. Drop a sunflower seed into the hole. Cover it with a little soil, Spray or sprinkle some water on top.
- 3) Plant one sunflower seed in each cup. Give each one a name and write it on the side of the cup. Put the cups on a sunny windowsill. Now wash your hands.
- 4) Spray the soil with water whenever it feels dry.
- 5) Your plants should pop up through the soil after about 1 or 2 weeks! When your plants grow too big for the cups, plant them in bigger flowerpots. You could put the pots in a sunny spot outside. You can also plant your seedlings directly into the garden once the weather gets warm enough by mid-May. Your plants should flower after about 8 weeks.
- 6) Be sure to keep you sunflower plants watered.
- 7) When the sunflower heads start to turn brown, cut them off and hang them somewhere dry and airy. When the seeds are dry, rub them together to loosen them.
- 8) Birds can eat your seeds if you leave the sunflower heads to dry in the garden. Or put some seeds in a bird feeder. Save a few to grow more flowers!



TOWN HALL MEETING RE: PUBLIC SAFETY
